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2 Introduction

2.1 Genesis Healthcare System: Good Samaritan and Bethesda Hospitals.

Genesis HealthCare System is a family of health care and related organizations, based in Zanesville, Ohio. Genesis' flagstone organization is its not-for-profit hospital that operates at two sites — Genesis-Bethesda and Genesis-Good Samaritan — in Zanesville, Ohio.

Genesis is the largest health care provider in its six-county region of southeastern Ohio, which includes Muskingum, Morgan, Perry, Coshocton, Noble and Guernsey Counties. Genesis provides a higher level of service than what is typically found in a community of its size including: open-heart surgery, trauma care, a Level II neonatal intermediate care unit, neurosurgery and comprehensive cancer services. This level of care has established Genesis as a primary referral center for much of the region.

2.2 Mission

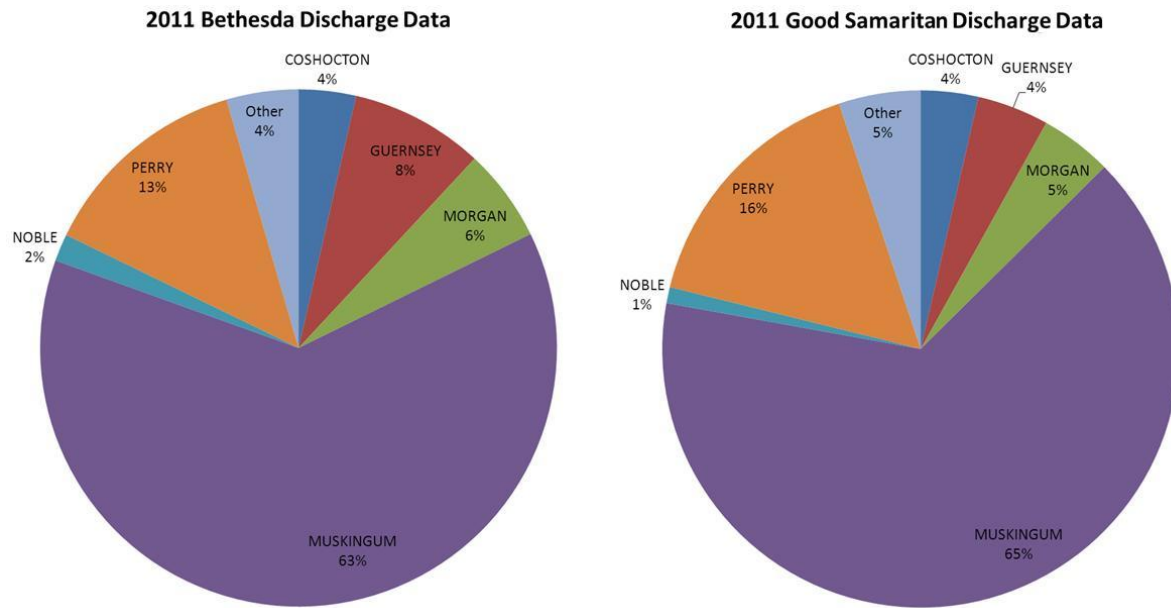

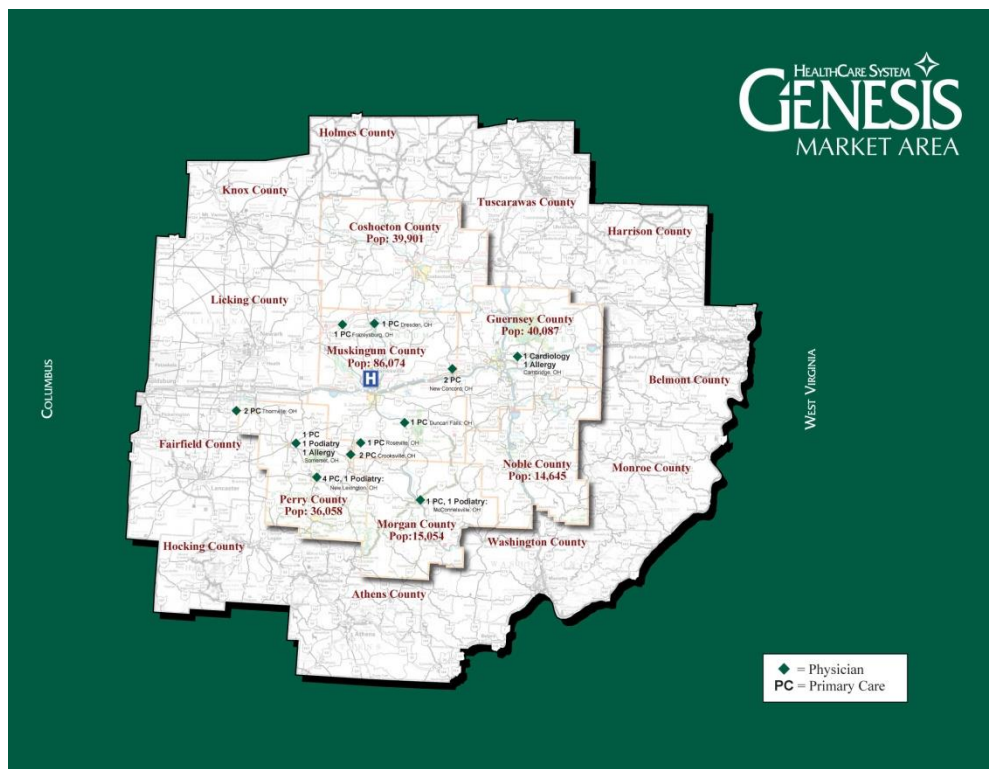

3 Community Description



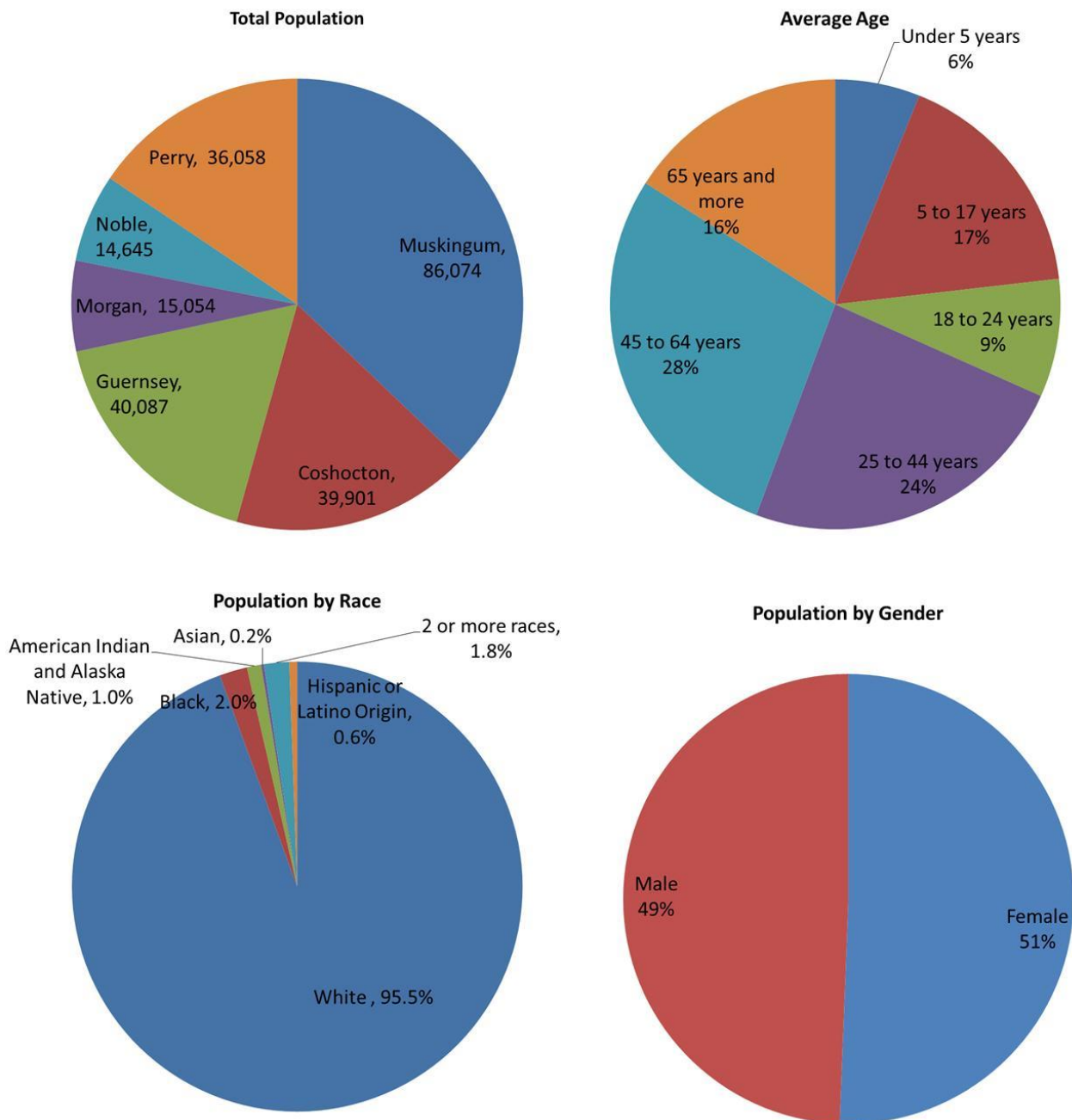
3.1 Service Area

The community that we serve is defined for the Community Health Needs Assessment based on the primary service area of the hospitals. The area includes the Ohio Counties of Muskingum, Perry, Morgan, Noble, Guernsey and Coshocton. As shown above, approximately 4-5% of discharges come from outside the primary service area.



3.2 Population Demographics¹

All of the Counties in our community are located in the Appalachian Region, a region that extends from Southern New York all the way to Northern Mississippi. Population in the region is concentrated in Zanesville, Cambridge and Coshocton Cities while all Counties are considered rural in Ohio.

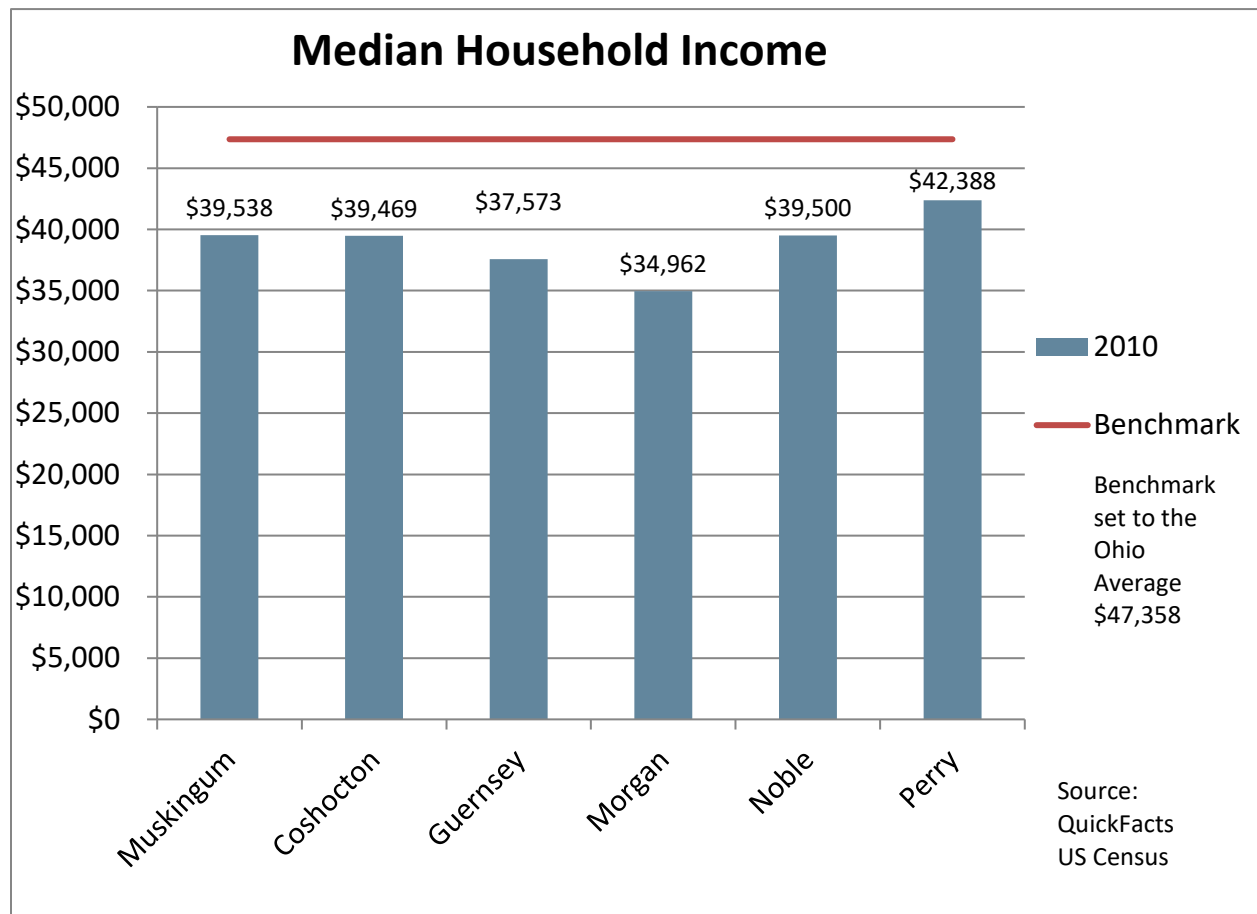

3.3 Socioeconomic Characteristics

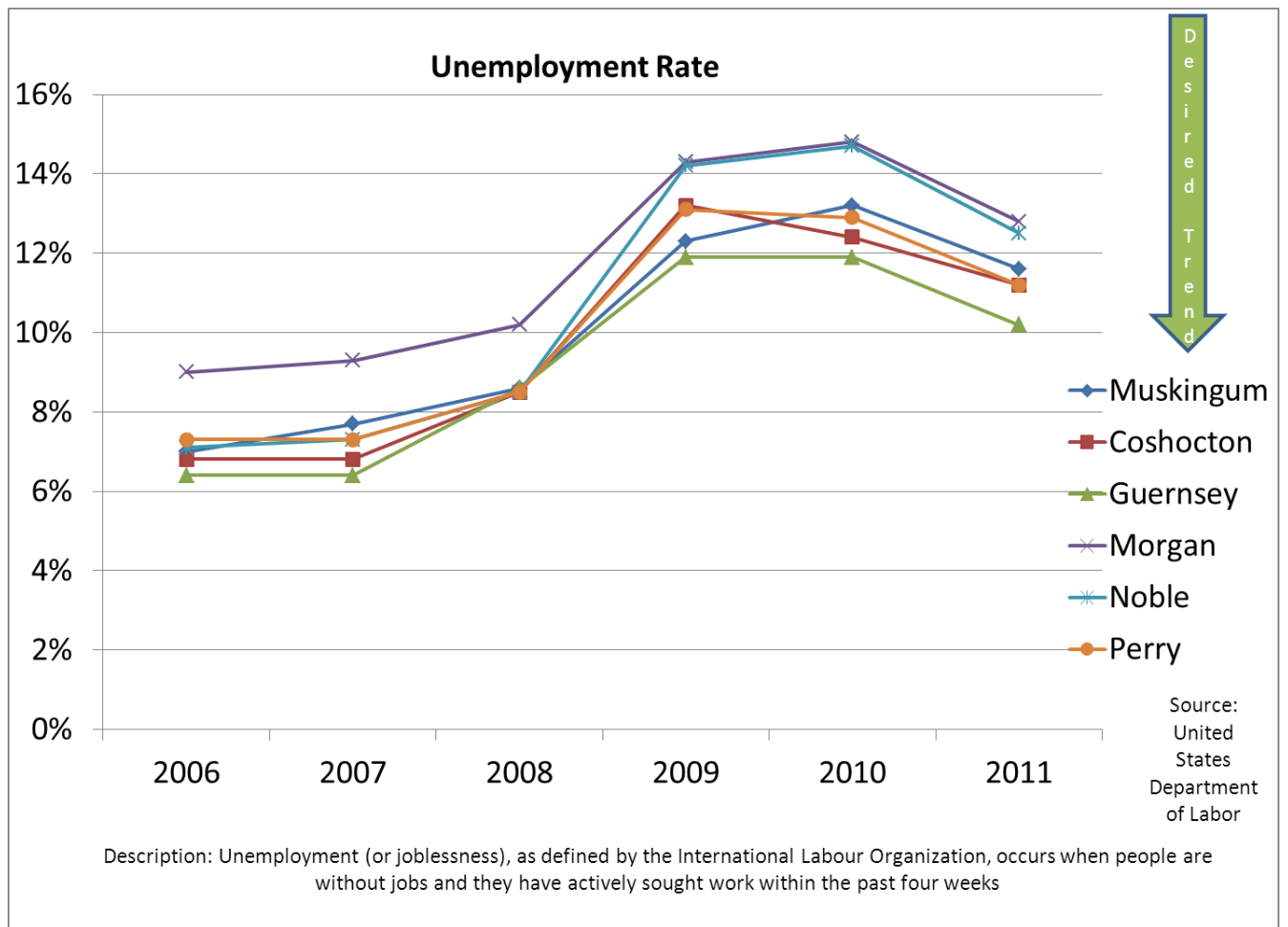
3.3.1 Family income and wealth-

The median household income is commonly used to generate data about geographic areas. It divides households into two equal segments, with the first half of households earning less than the median household income and the other half earning more. The median income is considered by many statisticians to be a better indicator than the average household income as it is not drastically affected by unusually high or low incomes. The national average for median household income is \$51,914 and Ohio's household median income, reported by the United States Census Bureau in 2010, was \$47,358.



3.3.2 Unemployment

Persons are classified as unemployed if they do not have a job, have actively looked for work in the past four weeks, and are currently available for work. The unemployment rates were reported by the United States Department of Labor in 2011. The national unemployment rate at that time was 8.9%. Within the past six years we have seen the unemployment rates rise and fall. The Counties' economies are slowly recovering from a downward spiral.



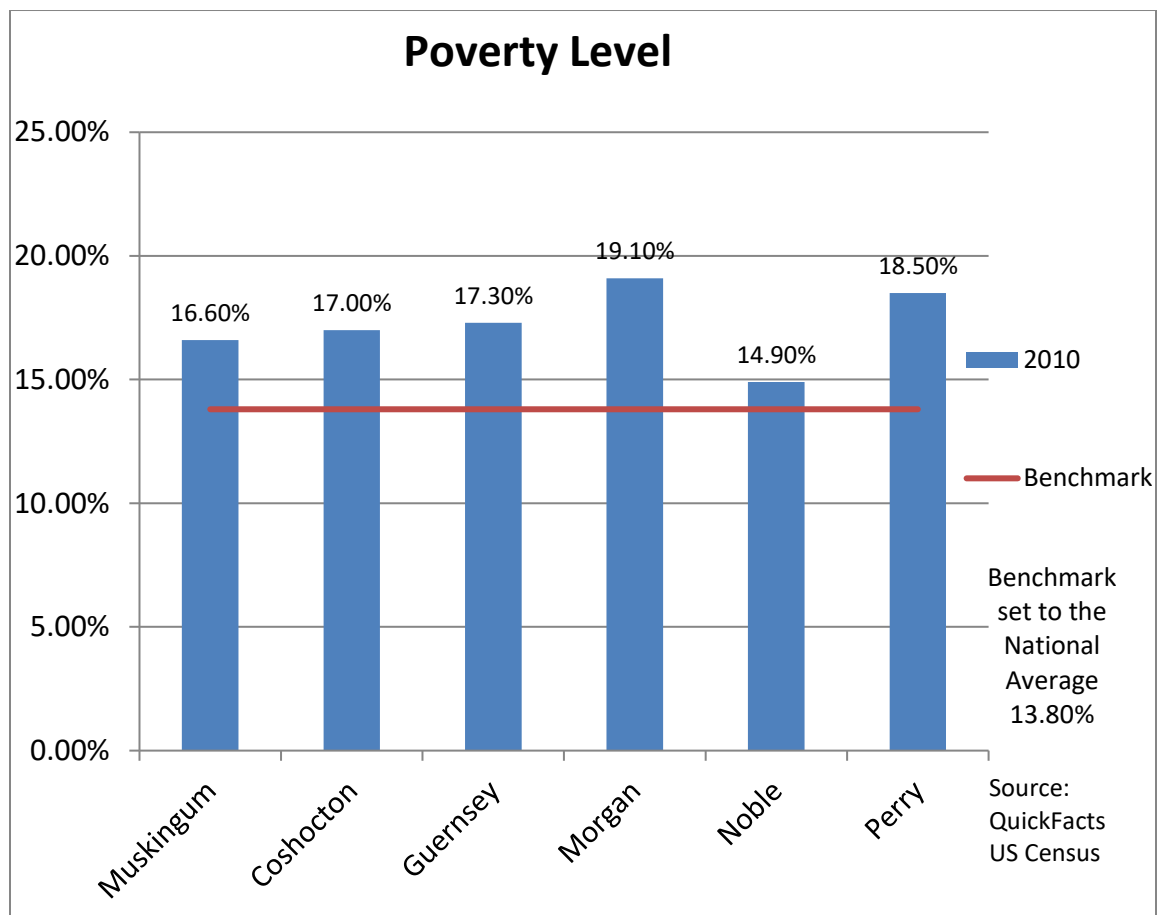

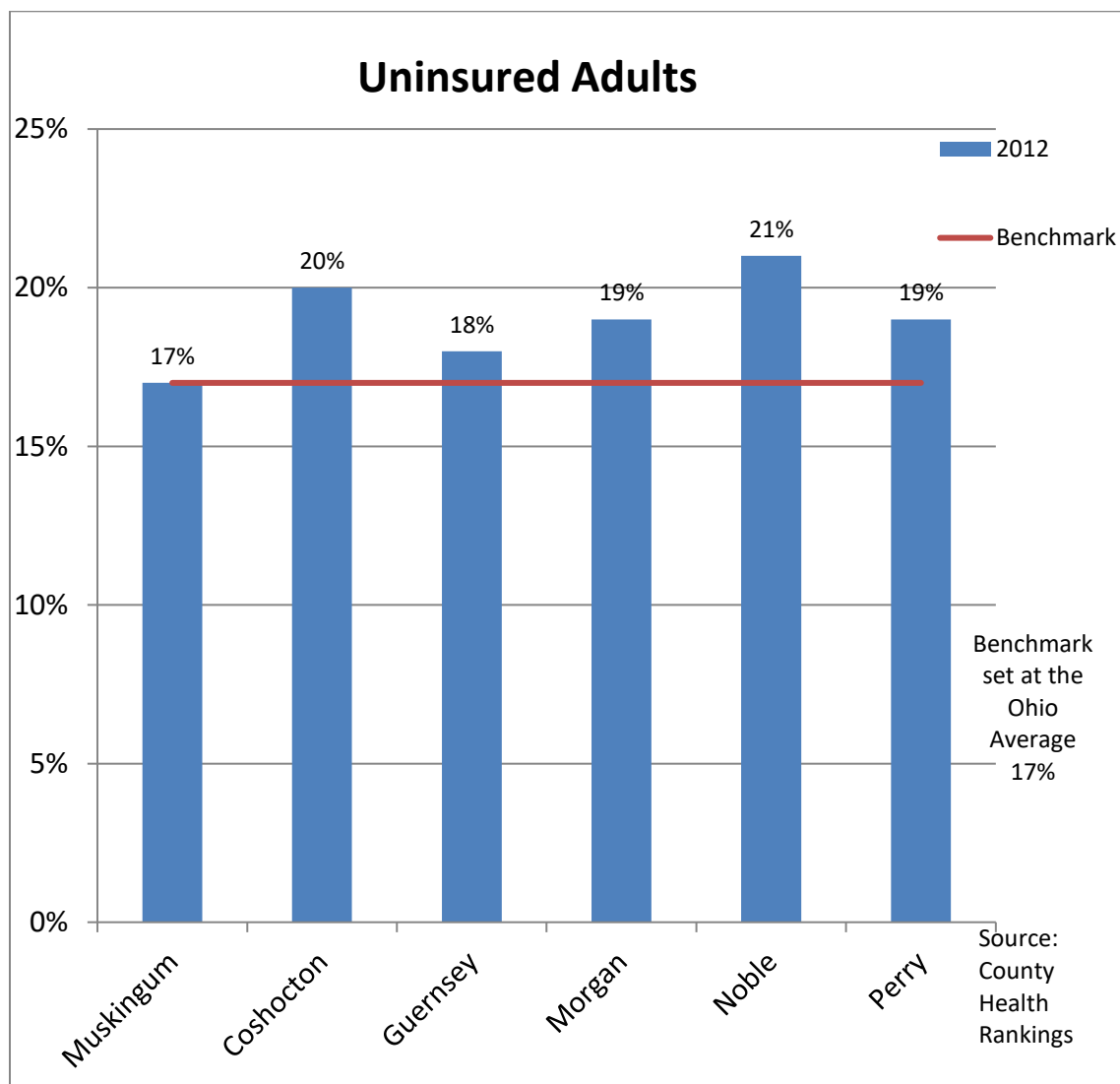
3.3.4 Poverty Estimate

The United States Census Bureau uses a set of money income thresholds in order to determine who is in poverty. If a family's total income is less than the family's threshold, then that family and every individual in it is considered in poverty. The official poverty thresholds do not vary geographically. The Quick Facts United States Census Bureau reports a national average of 13.80%. However, our community is well over the level of the national average.



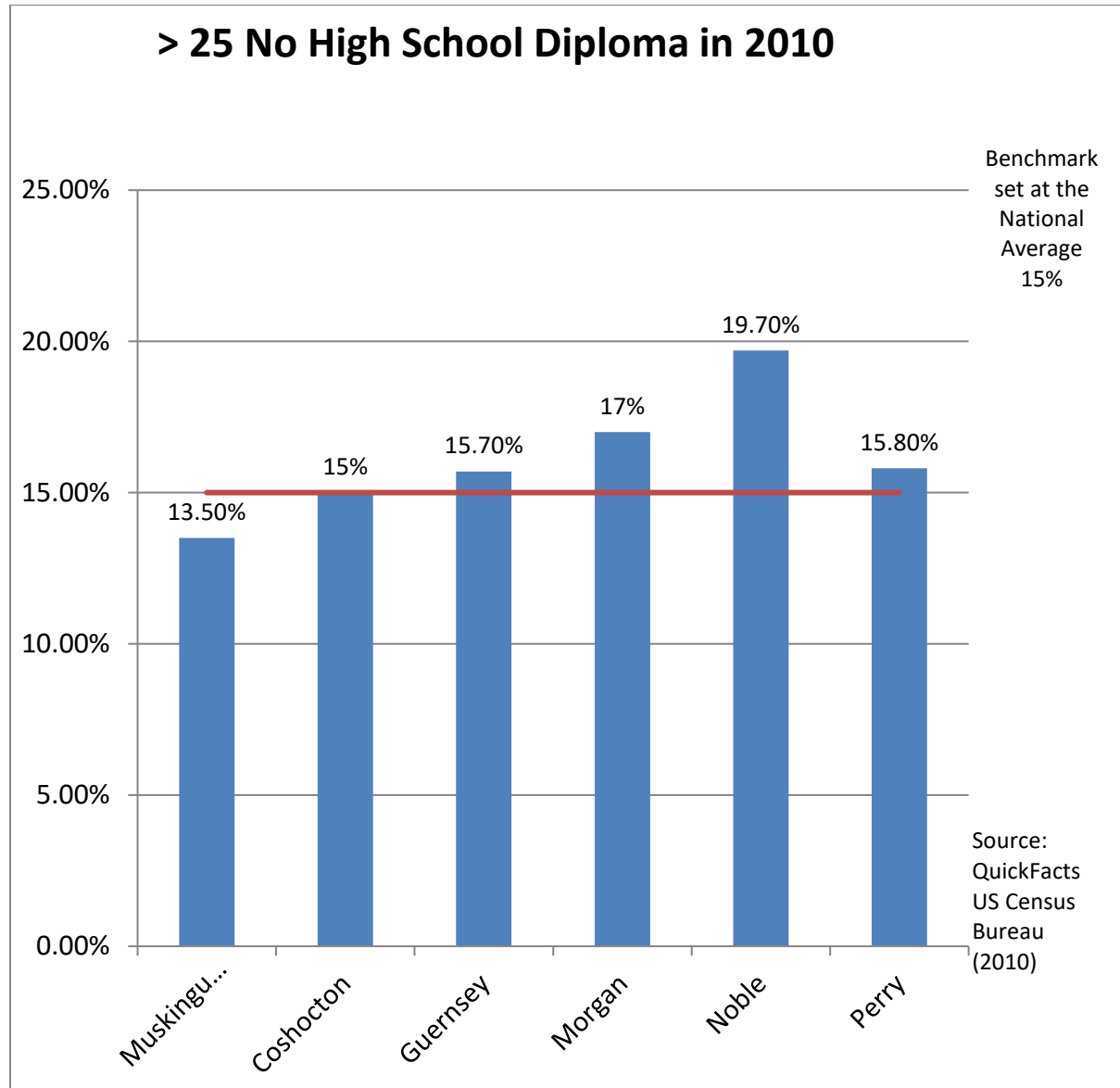
3.3.5 Uninsured Adults

To be uninsured for healthcare services means you are not covered under any type of health insurance. The United States Census Bureau separates insurance into two categories, public and private insurance. Public insurance is government based and private insurance includes insurance you have purchased from a private insurance company or insurance provided by your employer. 3.3.6 Education

For the population who were 25 years of age or older with no high school diploma in 2010, Muskingum and Coshocton Counties were the only two counties who were less than the national average set by United States Census Bureau. The data shown below shows a person who may have attended high school through the twelfth grade and did not receive a diploma, quit on or before completion of the twelfth grade or never attended.



4 Process and Methods

4.1 Task Force

The Community Benefit Committee at Genesis HealthCare System created a Community Health Needs Assessment Taskforce for the purpose of performing research, aggregating the County based needs assessments, conducting interviews, surveys and identifying and prioritizing the needs documented in this report.

4.1.2 Community Input

Community Focus Groups were conducted in the County Level needs assessments. On 1/19-1/20, 42 key stakeholders assessed various aspects of the health system in our community.

Key informant interviews were conducted in the community and contained categories for behavioral risks, moms and babies, mortality rates and poverty. Special care was used to identify key informants with knowledge of uninsured persons, low-income persons, and minority groups. In addition, we have identified the key informants specifically as (1) persons with special knowledge or expertise in public health; (2) representatives from government or public health departments and (3) leaders, representatives, or members of medically underserved, low income, and minority populations, and populations with chronic disease needs.

Community survey data was accumulated from each of the County based initiatives including: Muskingum, Coshocton, Guernsey, Noble and Perry Counties. Special care was taken to outreach to special needs through the use of County Fairs.

In addition to the thousands of County based surveys conducted over the past 24 months, Genesis Healthcare Systems posted a Community Health Needs Survey online in the summer of 2012 and used Facebook, Twitter, and the Zanesville Times Recorder to publicize the Community Health Needs Survey. In order to make sure that the medically underserved were reached through direct outreach to County Fairs, Health Centers, Churches and Senior Centers.

4.1.3.1 Established criteria:

The taskforce reviewed available data and benchmarks, key informant interviews, surveys and all available county needs assessments. Over the course of 6 weeks during the summer of 2012, the group rated each element from 1 to 5 with five being the greatest need. The ratings were weighted equally using the based on the following criteria:

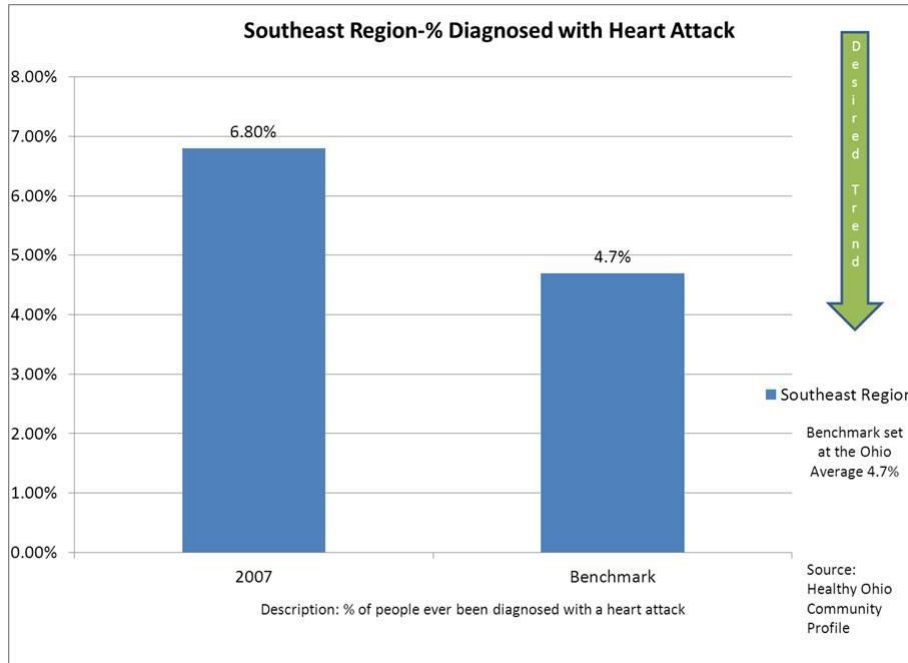
- Magnitude – How many people in our community are affected?
- Severity- How serious is the problem, including risk of morbidity and mortality?
- Benchmark gap- Is the problem worse in our community?
- Historical trends- Is the problem getting worse over time?
- Is there an ability to impact the problem?
- Is there a disproportionate impact on vulnerable populations? (uninsured, low-income persons and minority groups)
- Are there resources available to address the problem?
- Is there a solution with a high probability of success?

4.1.3.2 Identify and Document Information Gaps

The taskforce was unable to incorporate data from a community health needs assessment or community health improvement plan specifically addressing the health needs of Morgan County.

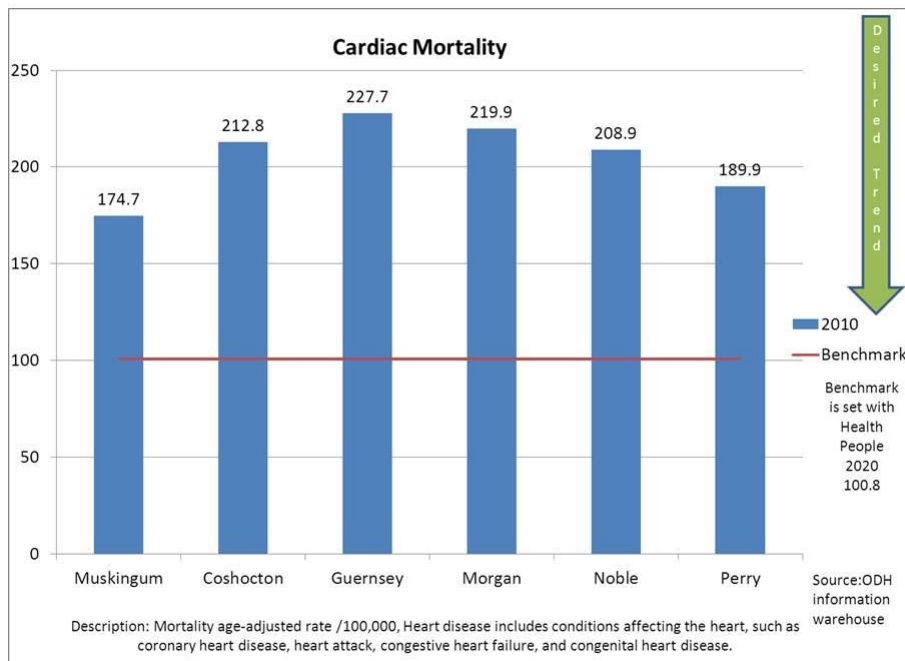
4.1.3.2.1 Cardiac Disease

Cardiovascular disease remains the leading cause of death for most racial/ethnic groups



nationwide and worldwide. According to the WHO, cardiovascular death has declined in high income countries, but has increased in low and middle income countries. In light of this fact, it's especially concerning that the counties in the Genesis service area range from 1% to almost 6% above the average US

poverty level of 17%. The correlation to cardiovascular mortality can be seen in the 2007



statistics that cardiovascular mortality ranges from 48.7 to 101.7 deaths per 100,000 higher than the national average of 126.0.

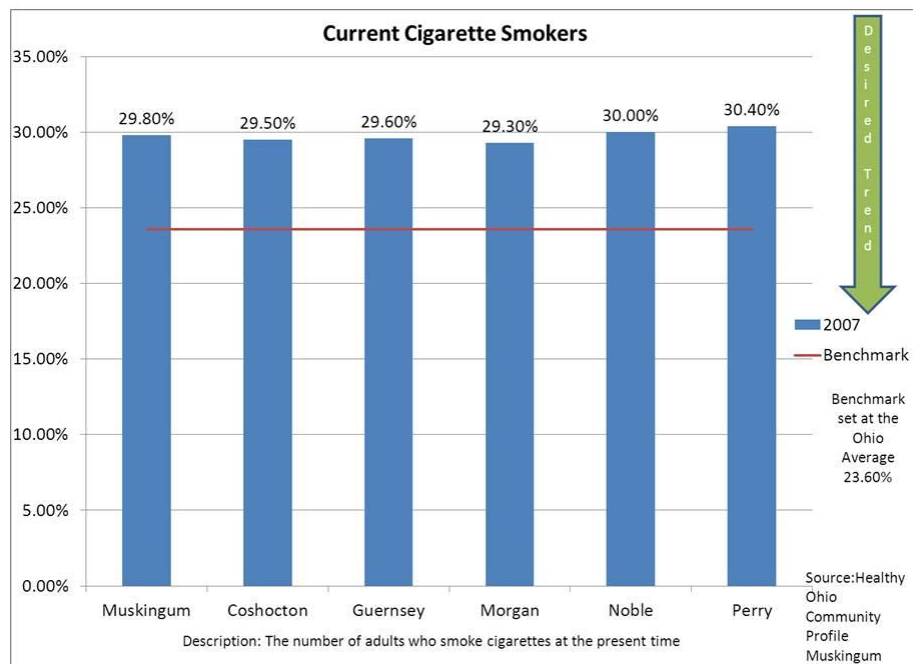
Cardiac disease, or diseases of the heart, includes coronary artery disease, congenital heart disease, rheumatic heart disease,

cardiomyopathies and cardiac arrhythmias. Coronary artery disease is the most preventable of the cardiac diseases. The underlying disease process, known as atherosclerosis, can cause a heart attack. The incidence of heart attack in the southeast region of the Genesis service area is 6.8%, 2.1% higher than the state of Ohio average of 4.7%.

The early changes of heart disease, or atherosclerosis, develop in childhood and adolescence due to the overall effect of a number of risk factors. They include tobacco use, physical inactivity, unhealthy diet, harmful use of alcohol, hypertension, diabetes, raised blood lipids, obesity, poverty, low educational status, advancing age, male gender, genetic disposition and psychological factors.

In areas that have experienced reduced numbers of deaths from cardiac disease the reduction has been attributed to reduced incidence rates and/or improved survival after cardiovascular events due to prevention and treatment interventions. A large percentage of cardiac deaths are preventable through the reduction of behavioral risk factors: tobacco use, unhealthy diet, physical inactivity and harmful use of alcohol. In turn, these unhealthy behaviors lead to intermediate risk factors that contribute to the atherosclerosis process that develops over many years. These intermediate risk factors include: high blood pressure, diabetes, and increased blood lipids.

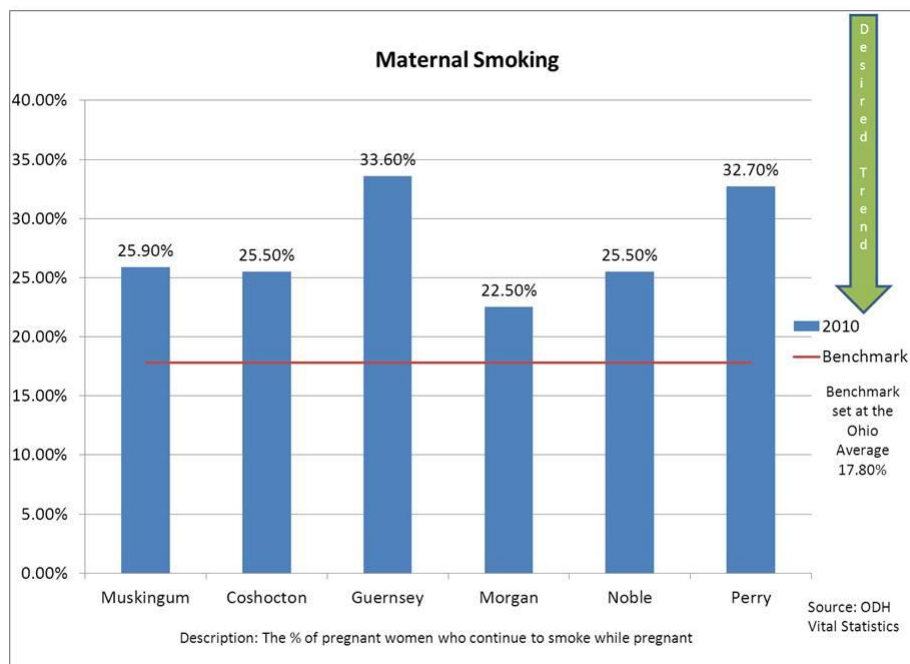
4.1.3.2.2 Smoking



Once again it's not surprising to see that the prevalence of cigarette smoking in the Genesis service area ranges 5.7% to 6.8% above the already distressing Ohio average of 23.6%. Most health organizations publish that tobacco use is the single most preventable risk factor for death and disease.

The impact of maternal smoking is

costly to both the smoker and to unborn child. Smoking while pregnant often results in: increased fetal heart rate, increased incidence of miscarriage and stillbirth, increased risk of premature birth and/or low birth rate, and increased risk of the baby developing lung problems. The incidence of maternal smoking in the Genesis service area ranges 4.7% to 15.8% above the Ohio average of 17.8%.



4.1.3.2.3 Drug Abuse

One in four Americans experiences a mental illness or substance abuse disorder each year, and

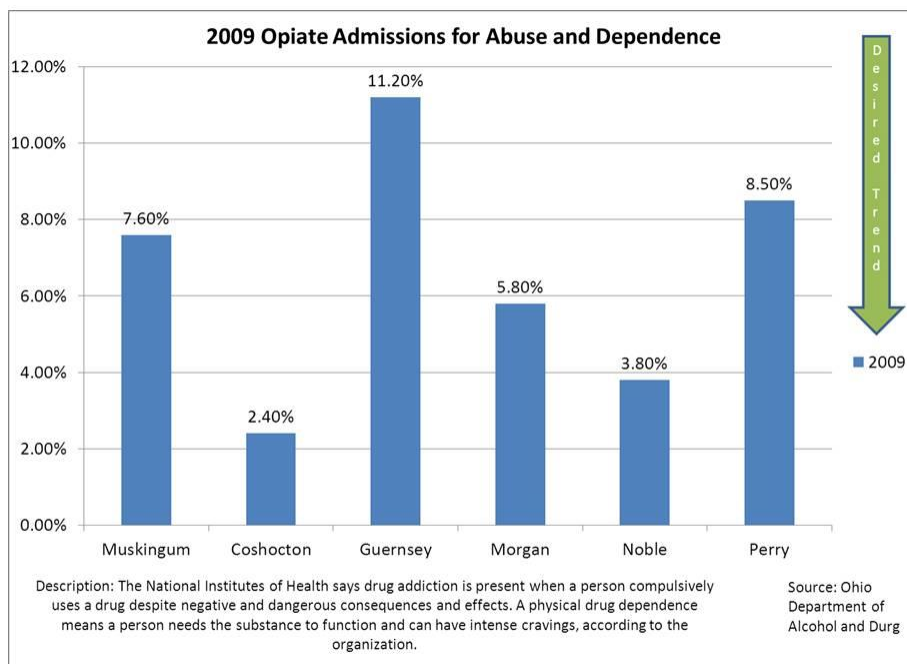
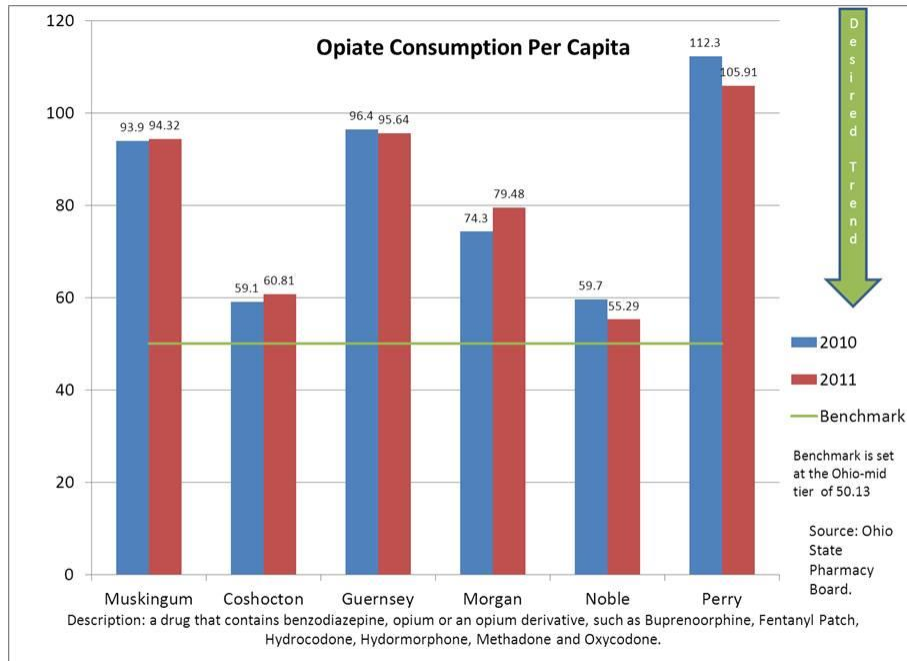
the majority also has a comorbid physical health condition.

Opiate medication abuse, as well as illegal opiate abuse, is a growing problem. The increase in prescription opioids in the past 10 years coincides with a comparable rise in unintentional overdoses attributed to opioids, a rise of 374%.

Unintentional drug overdoses has eclipsed traffic crashes as a cause of death.

Additionally, there has been a rise in property crimes in the Appalachian Counties in Ohio.

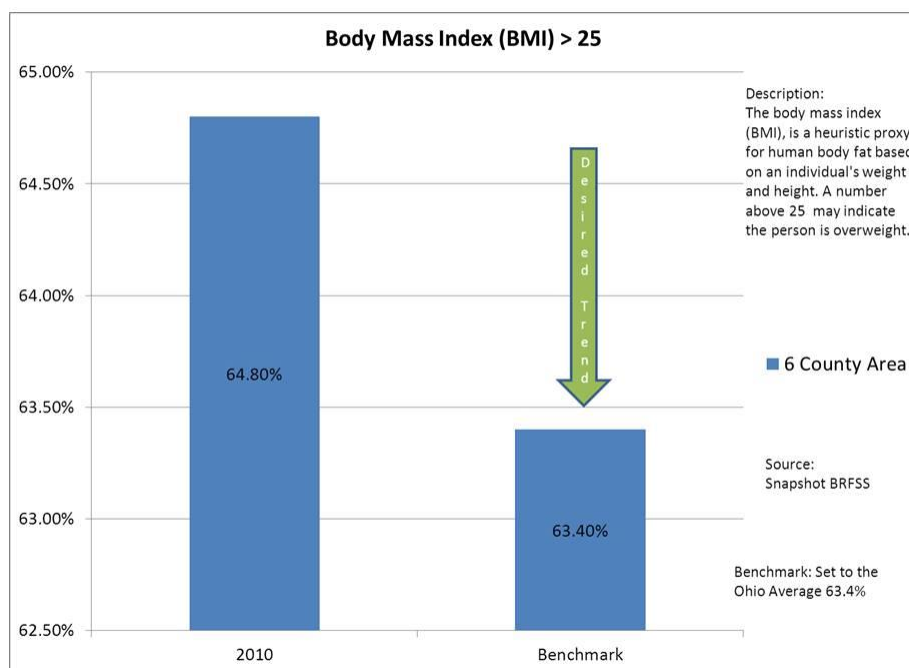
Other drugs of abuse are prevalent as well.⁴ The current availability of powdered cocaine remains

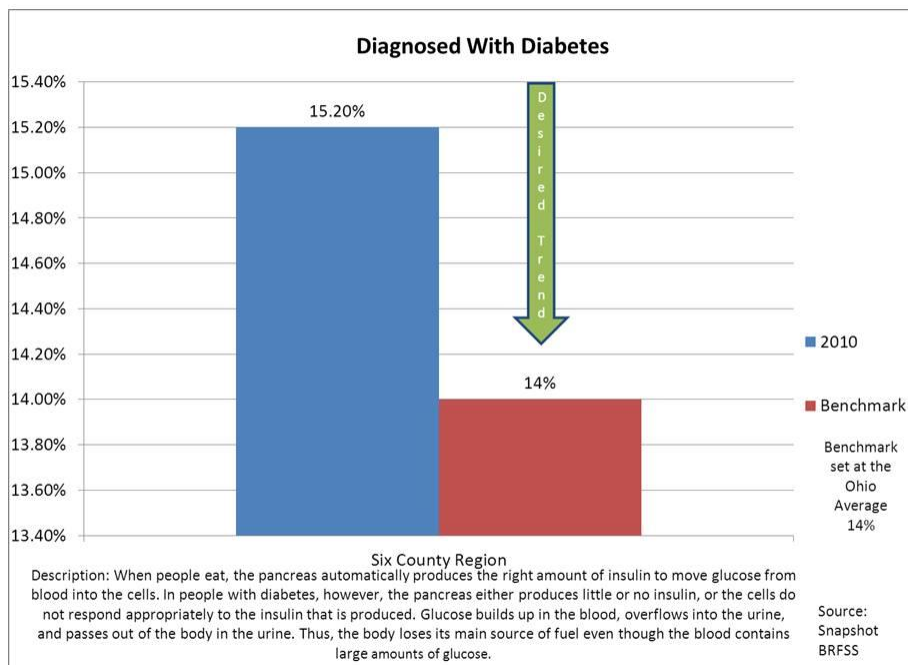
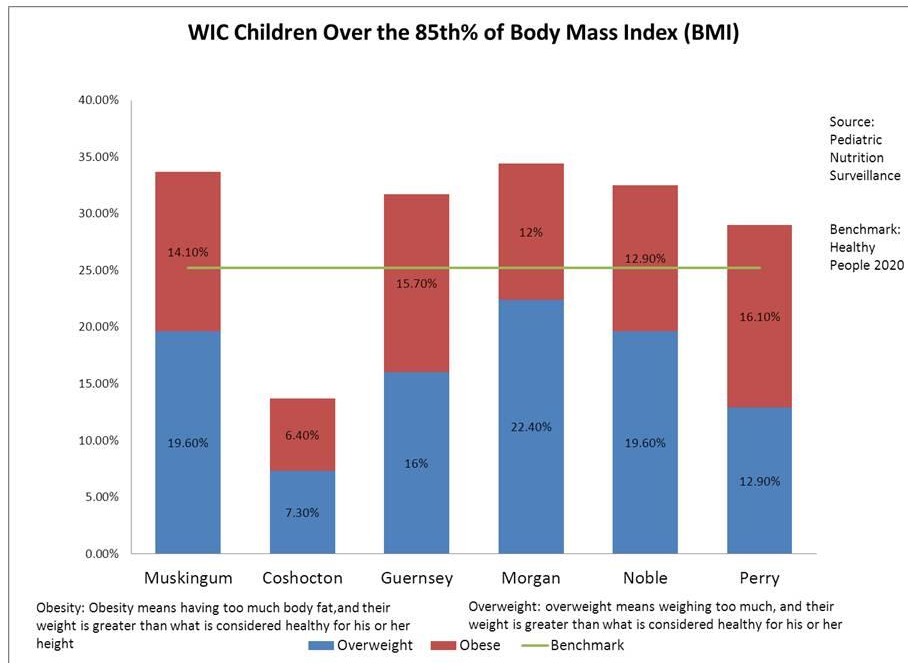
variable in the region, with participants reporting differing availability scores by county. Participants in Guernsey and Muskingum counties reported current availability of powdered cocaine as moderate, with a mean availability score of ‘7’ out of ‘10’. Crack cocaine remains highly available in the southeastern Ohio region. Heroin remains highly available in the region. Participants most often reported overall heroin availability as ‘10’ on a scale of ‘0’ (not available, impossible to get) to ‘10’ (highly available, extremely easy to get). Participants and community professionals in the most recent survey (January, 2012) most often reported the current availability of these drugs as ‘10’.

4.1.3.2.4 Body Mass Index (BMI) Greater than 25



Body Mass Index (BMI) is a number calculated from a person's weight and height. BMI is a fairly reliable indicator of body fat for most people. BMI does not measure body fat directly, but research has shown that BMI correlates to direct measures of body fat. Individuals who are living a lifestyle of

being overweight or obese are at an increased risk for the following health problems: hypertension, high cholesterol, type 2 diabetes, coronary heart disease, stroke, gallbladder disease, steoarthritis, sleep apnea, respiratory problems, and some types of cancer (endometrial, breast, and colon). A BMI of ≥ 25 categorizes a person as overweight. The % of population in Ohio with a BMI ≥ 25 is a shocking 63.4%. The Genesis service area average is 1.4% higher. Translated to the pediatric population, 29.2% of the pediatric population is considered overweight or obese.



Diabetes is the seventh leading cause of death in the US. Diabetes lowers life expectancy by up to 15 years, increases the risk of heart disease by 2 to 4 times, cardiovascular disease accounts for 60% of deaths in diabetics. Diabetes is the leading cause of kidney failure, lower limb

amputations, and adult onset blindness. The percent of the population diagnosed with diabetes has climbed steadily over the last ten years and is tied directly to the increasing obesity rate. Ohio is above the national average at 14% of the population diagnosed with diabetes. Our service area is 1.2% above the state rate.
