EXCELLENT HEART CARE

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Tony and wife Leora spend summer days at Seneca Lake.

Tony Cruise was scheduled for a routine colonoscopy when caregivers at Genesis discovered a heart problem. An electrocardiogram (EKG) was done as part of routine tests to prepare for the colonoscopy due to his age, and an irregular heartbeat was found. Then a heart catheterization was performed, locating a blocked artery to his heart.

"Somebody was paying attention," said the Cumberland man of the caregivers who first spotted the irregular heartbeat. If the blocked artery hadn't been found, it's possible he could have had a heart attack.

Tony, who had never had any symptoms of heart problems, needed Coronary Artery Bypass Grafting (CABG). In the procedure, a healthy artery or vein is grafted to the blocked artery to create a new path for the blood to flow to the heart.

Family and friends suggested Tony travel to a Columbus hospital for the procedure. "I wanted to stay here," said the retired meat cutter. "I'd heard lots of good things about the cardiac care at Genesis and how they'd spent many years building up the heart team."

Why Go Anywhere Else?

Eduardo Jorge, M.D., a cardiothoracic surgeon with the Southeastern Ohio Heart, Lung & Vascular Center, is a member of the Genesis heart team. He performed Tony's surgery. "Mr. Cruise required CABG for his blockage; his problem couldn't be corrected with angioplasty or stenting," Dr. Jorge said.

Dr. Jorge has been performing heart surgery for more than 20 years and has been at Genesis since 2005. "We are in the top 10% nationwide for coronary bypass surgery," he said. "People think you have to go to a big city hospital for care. Why do you need to travel far from home when you have the same or better care right here?"

A Ouick Recovery

Tony is glad he stayed close to home for care and was surprised at his quick recovery. "I was amazed at what I was able to do," Tony said. "I was out running around the yard with my dog in less than three weeks, while my brother-in-law, who had a similar procedure about a year ago at a Columbus hospital, is still having problems."

Tony was impressed with the compassionate care he received before and after the procedure. "The doctor explained the process in detail and even drew pictures of what was going to happen," he said. Tony's brother-in-law reported learning more from the heart specialists at Genesis than his own physicians.

Unexpected Benefits

There were several benefits of the procedure Tony didn't anticipate. He finds his Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD) has improved, and he barely coughs anymore. He also joked that the cobra tattooed on his chest looks like it has never been touched.

The outward appearance wasn't important to him, he admitted, but the compassionate care was. "I received excellent care," Tony said. "I'm glad I decided to stay here instead of going to a large city. I'd highly recommend Genesis to anyone who has to go through this."

DESIGNED FOR YOU

Patients Stay in Model Rooms

Genesis did something few hospitals have done before built model patient rooms so doctors, nurses, patients, visitors and families can offer feedback on the design – before more than 200 rooms are constructed in the new medical center.

"Only one other time in my 42-year career has a hospital constructed a model room with this much detail," said David C. Brown, director, Global Construction Practice, Navigant, a firm that oversees and manages hospital renovation. The other hospital was a university facility in the Eastern United States.

Two model rooms at Genesis-Bethesda are complete with everything needed during a hospital stay. The all-private rooms are real rooms that will be used for orthopedic care once the new medical facility is complete. The rooms were created to test the rooms' functionality, efficiency and comfort before completing the new medical center.

In July, more than 300 doctors, nurses and staff toured the rooms and offered feedback. The two rooms each had different details – like lights, toilets and curtains – so the doctors, nurses and caregivers had the chance to make comparisons between the two.

"Every staff member had at least one suggestion," said Abby Nguyen, chief nursing officer at Genesis. "We identified so many little things – like making sure there's a light over the sink or moving the patient call light where it's easier for the patients to reach."

Rooms Impact Healing

All these little details can make a big difference because studies show room design contributes

to healing. The hospital in the East that built a model room and made improvements was ranked in the 99th percentile in patient satisfaction a year after the new facility was complete.

"We don't want to diminish

the impact the caregivers have on care," Brown pointed out. "But getting the little details right in patients' rooms allows staff to perform at their best." There are many details and designs in the model room, like a nurse server that saves caregivers time walking down the hall for medications and supplies – time that can be spent with patients.

Saving Big Costs Later

The model rooms also provide the opportunity to make small changes now – saving big costs later. "A small change in the room can cost \$500 to \$1,000. Multiple that by 200 rooms and we're looking at \$100,000 or more," said Al Burns, chief development officer at Genesis. Those cost-savings can be used to care for members of our community.

A Test Run

Kathy Doughty had the opportunity to test a model room during her three-day stay following total reconstructive hip surgery. She readily agreed to stay in the model room and offer input into the design. Kathy, her family and visitors completed surveys rating everything from the bathroom to the bed. "The beds were really comfortable – especially for a hospital bed," Kathy said.

One of the first things that caught her eye when she entered the room was the soothing light green color. She also appreciated the large windows, night lights next to the bathroom door and big screen TV. And she was able to offer some ideas on ways the room could be improved -

such as more storage space. "I'm glad I was able to stay here and have a say in what the new rooms will look like."

One Chance to Get It Right

Some other patients, families and visitors will have a chance to offer input into the model rooms. "I would never buy a car without giving it a test drive, so why would we want to build rooms to care for people in our community without trying the design out first? We only have one chance to get it right," Burns said.

"The exciting part is this is a real room that will be used in the new facility," Brown said. "We're getting input from the entire spectrum – from the physicians to the patients – so everyone contributes to quality care."

THE COMFORT OF PALLIATIVE CARE

Susan Knicely had always been healthy and led a busy and active lifestyle on the family farm. When the 59-year-old woman was diagnosed with colon and liver cancer in March 2013, she handled the diagnosis as best she could. However, constant pain kept her from doing daily activities, and that's when her family encouraged her to get some relief.

Susan and her granddaughter Brooke Knicely enjoy the Muskingum County Fair, where they show cattle along with other family members.

Her oncologist, Scott Wegner, M.D., medical director of the Genesis Hematology & Cancer Care Center, suggested she seek help from Genesis Palliative Care. Soon after Dr. Wegner's referral, Susan met with Erin Remster, D.O., a Palliative Medicine physician. "I didn't really know what this kind of care was, but I was willing to give it a try," Susan said.

Blue Ribbon

"Palliative means comfort," explained Dr. Remster. "Palliative Care is specialized medical care to help people deal with the symptoms and stress of a serious illness. Sometimes patients with a serious illness have pain, shortness of breath, tiredness, difficulty sleeping, depression, anxiety and decreased appetite. We have a variety of ways to help manage these symptoms."

Palliative Care uses a team of caregivers including physicians, nurses, social workers, chaplains and others to help patients and their loved ones feel better, feel supported and have more control of their health care. The care can be appropriate for patients with cancer, as well as other illnesses such as advanced lung disease (like COPD or emphysema), advanced heart disease (including heart failure and valve disease), and liver, kidney and neurological diseases. "The goal is to improve the quality of life for patients and their families," Dr. Remster said.

Help With a Serious Illness

Dr. Remster talked with Susan and her family to find out the nature of her pain and help her find relief. "She involved the whole family in the conversation," said daughter Jenny Eck, a registered nurse. "She looked at the whole big picture to find out where Mom's pain was, if the pain was in the evening or if she woke up with pain, when the pain hit, and how severe it was. Dr. Remster dug a little deeper to help Mom get relief."



The relief, in Susan's situation, was a timed-release medication to help improve her quality of life. "After I had the appointment with Dr. Remster, I began getting up in the morning feeling more rested," Susan said. "It makes a big difference in how I see things – now I am a lot calmer. I never would have thought it would have improved my mood and appetite that much."

Susan's improved outlook also lifted her family's spirits. "When Mom was going through a rough time, the whole family fell into a little slump," Jenny said. "My mom used to be able to work circles around me. I think her biggest struggle was not being able to do the things she's used to doing."

A New Outlook on Life

"After Mom met with Dr. Remster, she has just flourished, and the care has helped her tremendously," Jenny said. "I think Palliative Care helps you deal with the disease. In my mom's case, she had pain, nausea and the anxiety of dealing with the diagnosis.

"If Mom wouldn't have gotten help from Palliative Care, she wouldn't have complained and probably would have continued to suffer alone," Jenny said. "The Palliative Care team helped her realize she doesn't have to suffer; there's help out there."

Susan is glad she could receive the specialized care close to home. "Dr. Remster was so caring and concerned about my well-being," Susan said. "She met with me at the Genesis Hematology & Cancer Care Center so I didn't have to make another appointment or go to another doctor's office."

Susan is back doing what she loves to do – cooking, helping out on the farm and enjoying her family of three grown children and 11 grandchildren. "I'm more relaxed, and I handle things a lot easier than before. I have a positive attitude now," Susan said. "With help from the doctors and nurses, and God on my side – I'm going to get through this."
