

What's Best for Children

The new facility is the only one in the area especially for children. From the pint-sized chairs to the colors, everything caters to children. "When we were designing the spaces, we concentrated on what's best for the children," said Lisa Lynn, manager of Genesis Outpatient Rehabilitation Services. "For example, we had to think of children with autism and their heightened sensitivity to stimulation, so the walls are painted in soothing, natural colors."

Allison Morgan's three children need to attend therapy at least twice a week. She is thankful they

can get the specialized rehabilitation they need in a place designed just for children. Allison admitted that at first, she was a little concerned about the new place. Two of her children were diagnosed with autism a year ago, and change can be a challenge for them. "Lucas doesn't

do well with change, so we weren't sure how he'd react," she said. "But he hasn't had any problems, and now says he's going to the new therapy."

Before Pediatric Rehab opened in July 2013, Allison's children, ages 9, 5 and 2, shared space with adults at Genesis' Center for Occupational & Outpatient Rehabilitation (COOR) for their speech, occupational and physical therapy. "Lucas is a rambunctious 5-year-old. I always worried about him running into an elderly person at COOR," she said. "The new facility is wonderful."

Allison likes the easy access to the new location near the Genesis HealthPlex on Maple. She also appreciates the comfortable waiting room where she can stay with her three-month-old child. "We have a new baby, so it's nice to have the room to wait for the children to finish therapy," she said.

Kyle Paladino, a physical therapist specializing in pediatric rehabilitation, finds children, parents and therapists all enjoy the new space. "We have our own space to let the children explore and be curious – safely," he said.

> Parents often say the new facility is soothing and helps the children settle in better. "A whole new world has opened up for the children," said Lynn. "The equipment is exciting and welcoming. It's a fun, safe, playful and therapeutic environment."

Along with a gym, there are hammocks and swings, a play area and a climbing wall. The climbing wall enables children to practice more advanced movements and work on elevation. If the children don't like the active areas, there are six private rooms for quieter therapy.

Allison is grateful. "We were impressed we have such good services available in a town the size of Zanesville," Allison said. "If we didn't have Pediatric Rehab here, we'd have to go to Columbus. The kids love it. It's been a lifesaver for our boys."

said the 42-year-old. Eric was sitting at his kitchen table when his right hand and leg went numb.

Eric called a friend who knew something was wrong when Eric could only mumble into the phone. The friend called 911 and Eric was rushed to Genesis-Good Samaritan where he was quickly evaluated by Bryan Bjornstad, M.D., neurologist and stroke medical director.

Genesis Emergency Department with tissue plasminogen activator (tPA), a medication that dissolves the blood clots and minimizes the effects of a stroke. tPA can only be administered within a few hours after the onset of the symptoms.

Genesis has a process to evaluate and treat stroke patients promptly. "We developed a stroke program to treat patients like Eric quickly," said Dr. Bjornstad. "It's a joint effort between the hospital administration, doctors, nurses and medical personnel all working together." A stroke alert is called and the experts go into action.


Care starts even before the patient arrives at the hospital. EMS alerts the emergency doctors that a patient showing stroke symptoms is on the way, so trained specialists can be ready when the patient arrives – saving precious time. "Eric's really fortunate he was able to get treatment quickly. If he hadn't, he might have been dealing with difficulties resulting from the stroke for decades," Dr. Bjornstad said.

Learning to Eat and Speak Again

Eric spent several days at Genesis-Good Samaritan, then went to Inpatient Rehab at Genesis-Bethesda where he got therapy to learn to eat, swallow and speak again. "Everyone treated me great. I couldn't have asked for better care." Eric said.

Eric was back to work less than three months after his stroke. "I really appreciate the support the doctors and staff in Inpatient Rehab gave me. I feel they went above and beyond to care for me," Eric said.

Brenda Willett, Eric's mother, came from the Dayton area to stay with Eric in the hospital and at home while he recovered. Brenda was so pleased with the prompt, compassionate care at Genesis that she wrote a letter to Dr. Bjornstad and the health care team. "Thanks for all you did for my son's stroke and health care during and after," Brenda said in the letter. "I am forever grateful to you. I still have my son."



Act FAST

Seconds count if you or someone in your family has signs of a stroke. The longer it takes to be treated, the more potential for brain damage. "Call 911 if you develop any stroke symptoms such as weakness, numbness, trouble speaking or seeing," said Dr. Bjornstad.

Use **FAST** to help you know what to do:

Look at the face and ask the person to smile. Is one side crooked or drooping?

A – Arms

Ask the person to raise both arms. Is the person unable to elevate one arm? Does one arm have a tendency to drift downward? Is one arm weak or numb?

S – Speech

Ask the person to speak. Are the words unintelligible or slurred? Does the person have trouble understanding you?

T – Time

Call 911 immediately if the person is experiencing any of these symptoms.

HOPE FOR THE FIRST TIME

Back Pain Treatment Center Helps

Everyone has back or neck pain at some point in their lives. The pain can keep you from enjoying life – and even from getting out of bed in the morning. The symptoms of back pain can vary from leg aches to headaches and can be difficult to diagnose. It takes a specialist to determine the exact cause and the best treatment.

Helping you get the best treatment as soon as possible is the goal of the Back Pain Treatment Center at Genesis. "People suffering from back pain don't always know where to start," said Keela Barker, director of Genesis Neurosciences. "The Back Pain Treatment Center helps you get to the right place so you can be treated quicker."

The center coordinates care between patients, their physicians, specialists in pain management, neurosurgeons and physiatrists (doctors focusing on injuries to the muscles, bones, tissues and nervous system).

It begins with a call to the Back Pain Treatment Center. Tisha Morrow, R.N., nurse navigator, talks with patients and coordinates care with specialists. "The center is designed to help people get to the right physician the first time instead of waiting days, or even weeks, to see another physician," Morrow said. "We ask questions about their pain to truly understand what's going on. Patients are happy to have a team dedicated to getting their treatment quicker and more efficiently." The navigator works closely with patients and the neurosurgeons to determine early in the evaluation if there are conditions that need surgery soon or if other treatments will work.

Coordinated Care Is Key

Carol Elias was one of the first patients to be helped at the Back Pain Treatment Center. She suffered from neck and back pain, and headaches for about 20 years, and the pain was getting worse. It would start in her neck and then develop into a migraine.

Carol had gone to a chiropractor to get relief for the back pain, a massage therapist to reduce the neck pain, and her primary physician for help with the headaches. Nothing seemed to help – and in fact the pain got worse. "I was in misery. I knew I'd have to do something because I was about ready to give up – thinking that I might have to live with this pain for the rest of my life," Carol said.

That's when she called the center. The specially trained navigator helped determine what tests were needed and coordinated care between the specialists.

Figuring It Out

"I felt I'd hit the jackpot," Carol said. "For the first time I had hope that these doctors and nurses were going to figure out how to keep me from being in constant pain." An X-ray and bone density scan showed she had compressed vertebrae, bone spurs and stenosis (abnormal narrowing of the spinal canal).

The nurse navigator, along with the spine and pain management specialists, developed a plan to help Carol. She received a pain reliever and a cortisone steroid injection so she could undergo physical therapy.

"Everybody has been helpful and extremely knowledgeable," Carol said. "The caregivers explained how the pain in my neck was connected to my headaches." Before seeking help from the Back Pain Treatment Center, Carol went to a different physician for each symptom. "I'd go to one doctor for one problem and another doctor for the other problem – when all the injuries were related," Carol said.

Feeling Better

After undergoing treatments, the constant throbbing pain in the back of her neck lessened, and Carol feels better. If she hadn't made the first phone call to the center, she'd continue to be in constant pain.

"I'd still be spinning around treating each thing like it was a separate problem – thinking all I needed to do was exercise or take vitamins," Carol said. "I didn't understand I had a multifaceted problem that needed addressed. For the first time, I have hope."

Construction Begins on Sarap Cancer Center

Construction of the Dr. Nick A. and Nancy R. Sarap Cancer Center began in September on the north end of Bethesda. Cancer services currently scattered throughout the community, such as radiation therapy, chemotherapy and medical oncology, will be under one roof when the center opens in the fall of 2014.

The building will be free-standing, yet connected to the main hospital by a walkway on the ground level. The treatment area where patients will receive chemotherapy is being developed by getting feedback from patients, physicians and other staff. Functioning models of the treatment area have been created and are being used for patient care, giving a real-life way to test the design.



Thanks for Your Patience

If you've been at Bethesda lately, you've no doubt experienced challenges driving around the campus. That's been especially true as the parking lots around the Physicians Pavilion have been affected by construction. As of this printing, the Physicians Pavilion parking lot was scheduled to open on Dec. 22, making it a little easier to access the building. Thank you for being patient with these parking challenges as we build your new medical center.

Medical Office Building

A medical office building, shown on the left in the drawing above, is also part of the new medical center, and construction is set to start in February or March. The two-story, 58,000 sq. ft. building will be built on the west side of the Physicians Pavilion. It will connect to the pavilion and the hospital to make it easy to move between the buildings. The first floor will include outpatient neuroscience and orthopedic services, as well as physician offices. The second floor will be physicians and services for heart and vascular care. The new medical office building will open in 2015.
