

dad Doug loaded their bikes and safety gear and headed to a private track in New Concord. Then the carefree Sunday afternoon took a different turn.

Garret crashed on the dirt track, and the handlebar of the bike hit him in the abdomen. He felt out of breath but tried to get back on the bike. That's when Doug noticed the area on Garret's stomach with the outline of the handlebar.

department to have the injury checked.

Doug rushed Garret to the Genesis-Good Samaritan emergency department. The young boy was in and out of consciousness on the way to the hospital, and he stopped breathing within five minutes after arriving in the ER. It turns out the impact of the handlebar caused blunt force trauma to his abdomen, tore his liver and caused internal bleeding.

The Level III trauma team, with physicians, nurses, advanced practitioners and other staff specially trained to deal with life-threatening injuries, immediately sprang into action. There were more than a dozen people in the trauma room working to save Garret's life.

"The emergency staff didn't lose any valuable time," said Doug. "If I would have had to travel farther, Garret would have died in our vehicle. Having a Level III trauma center close by means life to us. Until you have something like this happen to your family, you don't realize how important every minute is in saving a life."

The trauma team resuscitated and stabilized Garret before he was flown by MedFlight to Nationwide Children's Hospital in Columbus where he spent 22 days in January. A few days after Garret arrived at the children's hospital, Stuart Chow, D.O., medical director of trauma, at Genesis, received a phone call. "The trauma program manager at Children's called to congratulate the trauma team at Genesis for saving Garret's life," said Dr. Chow.

Genesis is the only Level III trauma center in southeastern Ohio, receiving the designation from the American College of Surgeons in 2011. "When someone comes in with a life-threatening condition like Garret's, we give them the best chance of survival," Dr. Chow said. "That's what we bring to our community – making a difference for those who are critically ill."

The Biedenbachs were so grateful, they returned to Genesis to thank the trauma team. "I met all of them, and told them thanks for saving my life," Garret said.

Garret's mom Tara gets teary-eyed when she talks about her son's recovery. "Having this level of care is a real asset for the community," she said. "If Garret would have had to travel farther from home for care, he might not be alive today," she said.

Today Garret is back to normal, playing football, having fun with his 12-year-old brother Casey, and riding bikes. "We had our miracle – thanks to Genesis," Tara said.

Saving Patients in More Ways Than One


What does it mean to have a trauma center closer to home? For the Biedenbach family in this story, it meant a life was saved. For many, the savings may be in a different form.

Before we had a trauma center in the community, patients with traumatic injuries were transferred to Columbus or other larger cities, either by ambulance or helicopter. Since the beginning of our Level III trauma center, we have treated 1,499 patients, and 81 percent of those patients were able to receive all their care at Genesis.

The big picture? If we didn't have trauma care at Genesis, patients would have spent an estimated \$1.4 million being transferred by ambulance and \$13.8 million by helicopter. These estimated costs are based on an average transfer cost to a Columbus hospital of \$1,600 per ambulance trip and \$16,000 per helicopter trip.

Along with saving lives, having trauma services closer to home has helped lower health care costs in our community.

When Karen Swinderman found out she had breast cancer, she didn't realize the role breast care navigators would play in getting her on the road to recovery. "What do I need them for?" she thought. "But I didn't know how crazy everything would get," said Karen.

A bus driver for Northern Local Schools, (Sheridan), Karen found a lump in her breast a few days before school started in August 2011. The lump was suspicious on the mammogram and ultrasound, and the biopsy results showed cancer.

"When Dr. Eladoumikdachi told me the tumor was cancer, I was terrified," she said. Firas Eladoumikdachi, M.D., a breast surgeon and medical director of the breast care program at Genesis, told Karen, "It's going to be all right. We'll work through this."

The breast care navigators at Genesis helped Karen work through the maze of appointments, tests, scheduling, radiation, a surgery to remove the tumor, and chemotherapy. "I don't know what I would have done without the breast care navigators. I probably wouldn't have showed up for half of my tests on time," Karen said. "When you have cancer, you don't feel like keeping track."

Karen didn't have to worry about keeping track. The breast care navigators scheduled her appointments for treatments and tests and called to remind her of the date, time and place. "They were great," said Karen. "They would schedule my appointments between the morning and afternoon bus route. By the time I got home, my next appointment would be on my answering machine." Karen was able to continue her school bus route throughout much of her 10 months of treatment.

Whatever a Patient Needs

Wendy Long, R.N., B.S.N., is one of the two breast care navigators at Genesis who helped Karen throughout her treatments. Along with scheduling appointments, the breast care navigators answered Karen's questions after hours and offered a shoulder to cry on.

"The what-ifs kept running through my head," said Karen. "I was terrified. I called Wendy and I just talked and talked, and she listened. When I started chemo, Wendy was there every day I went."

"We're the one person patients can call with questions or concerns," Long said. "We can talk to patients on a personal level and explain the medical terms in everyday language. They have so much going on, it's hard to remember everything."

Dr. Eladoumikdachi agrees. "The patients have a personal assistant who will help them navigate through all their care from surgeons, medical and radiation doctors or oncologists in a very timely and efficient manner," he said.

Karen is glad she could get timely care close to home. After her chemotherapy treatments, a lymph node biopsy showed no cancerous cells, and now she returns to the Genesis Breast Care Center every six months for a checkup.

A mother of three grown children, Karen is thankful she can get back to babysitting her 7-month old granddaughter during the summer. She is also grateful for the care she received at Genesis. "Everybody was so nice and caring," said Karen. "They treated me like I was the only patient they had all day. If I had to go through this experience, I'm glad I went through it here."

THE RIGHT PLACE for Heart Care


The day started like any other for Jim Beisser. He got out of bed and began to walk down the hallway in his home. All of a sudden, his legs buckled underneath him, and he couldn't move. His wife Marilyn immediately called 911, and the Falls Township/Fire Emergency Medical Services (EMS) squad took him to Genesis-Good Samaritan.

The diagnosis? A severe heart attack.

Fortunately, Jim was in the right place. Abdulhay Albirini, M.D., an interventional cardiologist and medical director of Genesis' cath lab, quickly performed a heart catheterization and cleared one large artery in Jim's heart that was 100 percent blocked.

The door-to-balloon time, or the time of Jim's arrival at the emergency department until the artery was opened, was 41 minutes — significantly faster than the American Heart Association's guideline of 90 minutes. The field-to-balloon time, or the time from the EMS arrival at Jim's home until the artery was opened, was 72 minutes — also better than the 90-minute goal.

Genesis Heart & Vascular Services consistently performs better than the national guidelines. In the first two quarters of 2012, 100 percent of patients had a door-to-balloon time of less than 90 minutes. "The more in compliance with guidelines we are, the better the outcome will be," said Dr. Albirini.



Receiving treatment quickly is critical to prevent damage to the heart. "The door-to-balloon time is a very important quality indicator in heart attack patients," Dr. Albirini said. "We're way above the average of the rest of the hospitals in the nation."

"It's a well-oiled machine," said Jim about the expert care he received. "Everybody from the local EMS to the cath lab team knew what to do." The entire team — from the local emergency personnel to the heart care team at Genesis — has advanced training to recognize and treat heart attacks. The emergency personnel are trained to read EKGs and relay the information to the specialists at Genesis so the heart care team is ready when the patient arrives at the hospital — just like in Jim's case.

Genesis has been recognized nationally for heart care and is the only health care system in southeastern Ohio to be a fully accredited chest pain center with PCI (percutaneous coronary intervention). This means Genesis has dedicated interventional cardiologists, cardiology specialists and emergency personnel trained to rapidly respond to and treat heart attacks.

"We continue to offer the same care as the big cities, and our goal is to prevent permanent heart damage by getting patients treated quickly," said Cathy Huggins, M.S.N., R.N.-C, CNL, CCRN, chest pain/heart failure coordinator at Genesis. "We want to get patients back to their lives."

Jim is thankful he's been able to get back to his life. After two days in Genesis-Good Samaritan, he was back enjoying retirement and returning to his woodworking and metal shop.

He's also grateful for the expert care he received. "They were ready for me when I arrived at the hospital," Jim said. "If they wouldn't have worked that fast, I definitely would have had heart damage, and I don't know if I would have made it."

MEET ERIN REMSTER, D.O. New Palliative Medicine Physician



Erin Remster, D.O., brings a new specialty – palliative medicine – to our community. The word palliative means "to provide comfort" and that is exactly what the palliative care team does. Patients in the hospital and in the community are often faced with life-changing illnesses or are dealing with

serious medical problems. Palliative medicine is specialized medical care for these patients to help deal with the symptoms and stress of serious illness and complex medical issues.

Dr. Remster works with a palliative care team that includes physicians, nurses, social workers and chaplains. The team helps to make sure pain and other symptoms are controlled; they also work with patients to better understand their conditions and the choices they have about their medical care.

"I'm excited to join the Genesis team, and we'll continue to give patients exceptional and compassionate care," said Dr. Remster. "Our goals are to give patients the best possible quality of life and offer comfort to them and their loved ones. We can help people at any age and any stage in a serious illness, along with the treatment they may be getting."

Originally from Ohio, Dr. Remster completed medical school at Ohio University College of Osteopathic Medicine in Athens. She finished an internal medicine residency at East Tennessee State University in Johnson City, Tenn., and returned to Ohio for fellowship training in hospice and palliative medicine at Summa Health System in Akron.

Dr. Remster and the palliative care team can help patients with serious illness by:

- Managing pain and symptoms like shortness of breath, tiredness, constipation, nausea, not wanting to eat, sleep problems and others.
- Helping patients make medical decisions by exploring what their wishes (also called goals of care) are.
- Working with patients' entire health care team to provide them with the best possible care.
- Making sure patients have the care and support they need at home and helping them move into hospice care, if appropriate.
- · Giving emotional and spiritual support to patients and families.


