# Partial Knee Replacement Surgery Offers High-impact Results

Skipping, jumping, crawling and hopping were all in the job description for Donelle Bookless. For nearly 30 years, Donelle taught physical education to elementary school students in West Muskingum Local School District, and she taught aerobics during 11 of those years.

Teaching others about physical health came naturally to Donelle, but after many years, the high-impact moves added up. She suffered from chronic arthritis pain of the knee, which had her undergoing occasional scoping and draining procedures, as well as receiving Cortisone shots for pain.

"As time passed, my pain got worse and the Cortisone shots wore off in shorter amounts of time. Plus, the arthritis pain began interfering with life too much. I went on vacation but couldn't walk with everyone else; it just wasn't fun anymore," Donelle said.



Surgeons at Orthopaedic Associates of Zanesville told Donelle that because her arthritis was isolated to the inner aspect of her knee, she was a good candidate for partial knee replacement surgery. The minimally invasive procedure came with major perks: a small incision, short hospital stay, less pain, quicker recovery and successful, long-term results.

"I was happy to learn that the implant for a partial knee replacement surgery lasts longer than a total knee replacement, the recovery is faster, and if I want to, I can even crawl around on my knees," Donelle said.

During partial knee replacement surgery, surgeons exchange the worn-out, dysfunctional part of the joint for a smooth metal implant, preserving the remaining healthy knee areas.

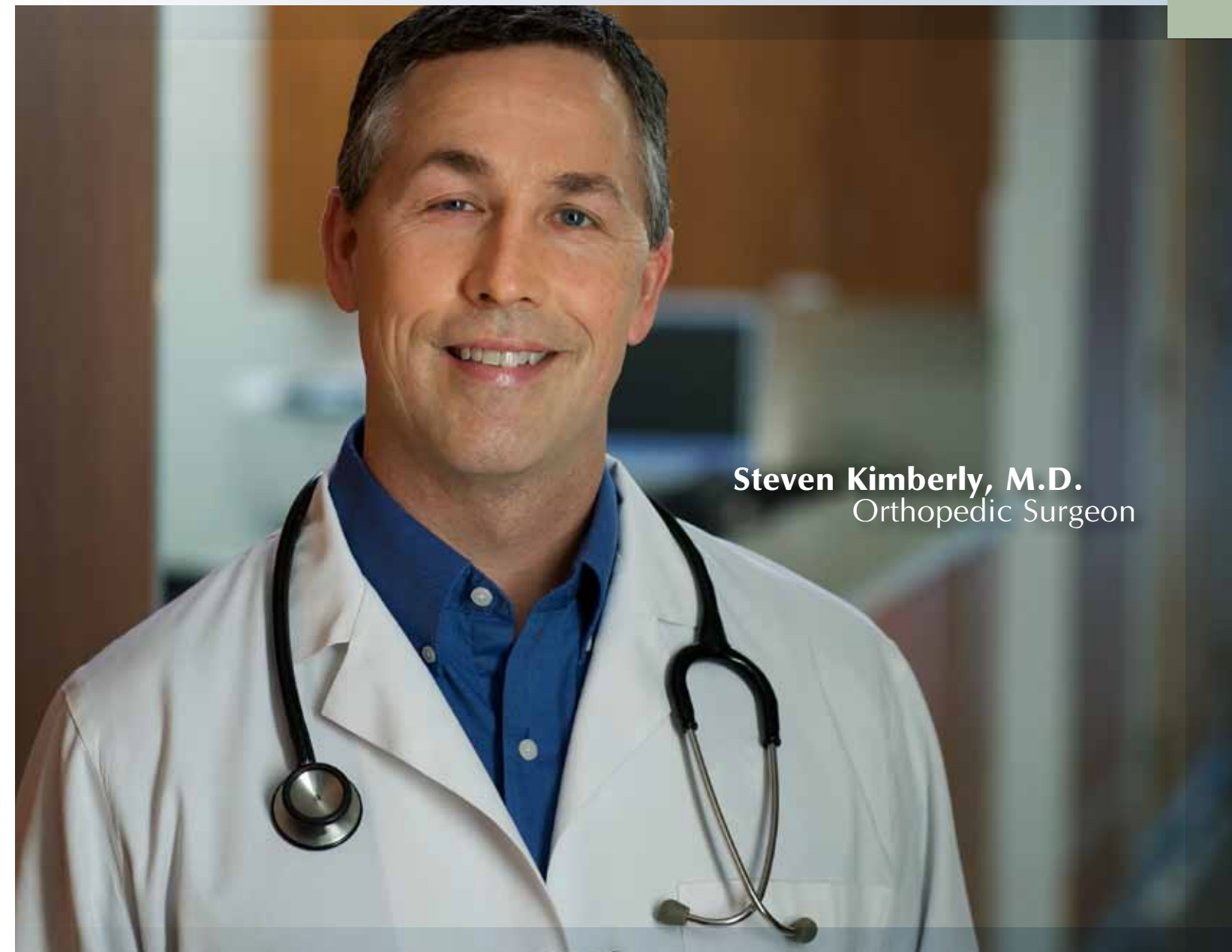
Patients begin rehabilitation just days after surgery, and quickly resume an active lifestyle with normal knee motion and function.

"Patients don't have to live with daily knee pain from arthritis that makes them dread everyday activities," said Steven Kimberly, M.D., orthopedic surgeon at Orthopaedic Associates of Zanesville. "Many people I see think they're too young or too old, or think recovery and surgery will be too hard. But if they're suffering on a daily basis, then this hour-long operation and two-day hospital stay can return them to a normal life."

The number one requirement for partial knee replacement surgery is that a patient's arthritis stays confined to one area of the knee. Usually, one in three knee arthritis patients qualify for a partial replacement surgery, bypassing a total knee replacement.

"If just one of the parts of the knee is worn out, we can just replace that part and leave the normal parts alone," explained Dr. Kimberly. "We offer a smaller operation to replace the isolated problem area, and we now offer it in Zanesville."

Donelle is thankful that because of the orthopedic surgeons and Genesis, she can get back to leading an active, healthy lifestyle.

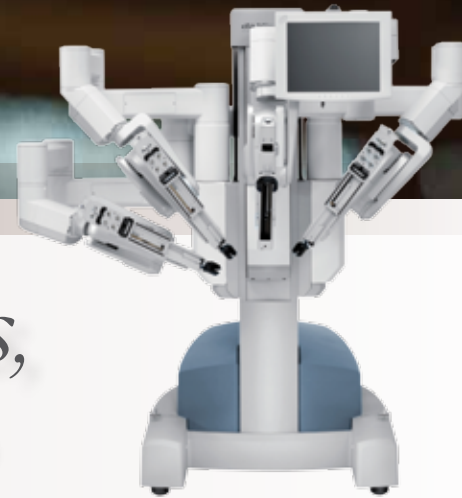

## *For Hysterectomy Patients, the Future Is Here*

Ironically, the surgeon behind the operating room's console – the one staring at a 3-D screen and manipulating joystick-like controls and foot pedals to maneuver her robot assistant – wishes she had had the same opportunity as the one her patient has.

Her patient, lying on an operating table across the room, directly under the robot's instrument-clad arms, is one of the first women to receive a robot-assisted, minimally invasive hysterectomy at Genesis.

"This new way of performing hysterectomies was approved just 6 months before I had my traditional hysterectomy," Linda Swan, M.D., OB/GYN, said openly. "As a physician, I hadn't even known about it; but if I had, when it was my turn, I would have raised my hand and jumped at the chance to have it done. This truly is the wave of the future."

The robot-assisted surgery may seem like something out of *The Jetsons*, but the futuristic, cutting-edge technology is reality; and it comes with benefits that patients and physicians could only dream about in the past.

"When we use the da Vinci Surgical System®, I can tell a woman she will have only four small incisions on her abdomen versus a 6 to 8 inch incision," said Dr. Swan. The patient requires little, if any, narcotics; can be back to work in two weeks instead of six; and only spends one night in the hospital, not three. Overall, it's safer, there's less pain and patients can get back to their life faster – you can't beat that."

Patient and Zanesville resident Susan Lasure agrees. When Susan learned she needed a hysterectomy and heard about the robot-assisted option, the benefits kept adding up.

"Dr. Swan explained how the surgery worked and said I'd be a good candidate for it. The shorter recovery time was the real selling point to me, because I just couldn't imagine taking six weeks off work," Susan said. "Plus, I wholeheartedly trust and respect Dr. Swan. She sat down and talked to me like a friend; sharing her personal experience with having a hysterectomy and then saying, 'If this was my body, here's what I would do.'"

Now, five months post-surgery, Susan feels extremely grateful that she could be one of the first three women to benefit from robot-assisted surgery at Genesis; and she shares the experience with her friends, touting the new ease associated with undergoing a hysterectomy the da Vinci way.

"People who saw me just a week or so after the surgery were amazed that I was up and about and had nothing but a few little cuts on my stomach – I highly recommend it! It's wonderful that in our town, we have the skilled doctors and state-of-the-art technology to provide this service for us," Susan said.

## Developing Trauma Care Closer to Home

When members of our community suffer from a serious, traumatic injury, they need immediate, quality health care – not a 50-mile ambulance or helicopter ride to a hospital. That’s why Stuart Chow, D.O., trauma surgeon and surgical intensivist, recently joined Genesis with the mission of leading a designated trauma program in Zanesville.

“We’re going to develop a trauma system here for our community and surrounding communities because Genesis has the capability to do it, and because it’s the right thing to do,” Dr. Chow said. “When traumatic injuries occur and a patient has to travel for care, there are a lot of factors that need to be taken into consideration; like loss of time for treatment, transportation expenses and added family concern to an already stressful situation. This community truly needs and deserves its own trauma system.”

Dr. Chow hopes Genesis can achieve provisional Level 3 trauma designation and begin serving trauma patients by the end of the summer. He plans to meet that goal by integrating and organizing Genesis’ expertise, resources and infrastructures during

the next few months, making sure to closely follow American College of Surgery trauma guidelines and criteria. He’ll also lead training with mock events and will work with Genesis staff to reach out to the community with efforts designed to educate people on how to prevent traumas.

With more than 12 years of trauma experience and recently serving as an attending trauma surgeon, intensivist

and general surgeon; medical director of surgical intensive care; and associate medical director of patient care services at Grant Medical Center in Columbus, Dr. Chow is prepared and enthusiastic about developing the Genesis trauma program.

“Zanesville is such an endearing community – the people are down to earth and very welcoming,” he said. “I look forward to serving them. I am thrilled to be a part of this opportunity to provide high-quality trauma care here.”

In addition to leading the development of the trauma program, Dr. Chow serves as its medical director. He will oversee the care of trauma patients throughout their hospitalization. He is board-certified in surgical critical care and general surgery and performs surgery on critically ill patients who might otherwise have to be transported to Columbus or elsewhere.

Detective work – not something you’d immediately associate with back pain. But that’s how William Chang, M.D., physical medicine and rehabilitation physician who recently joined Genesis, views it.

“I feel a little bit like a detective as well as a doctor,” said Dr. Chang. “I make sure I’m detail-oriented, I give time and attention to my patients, and I help solve the mystery by giving correct diagnoses along with a plan to get back to their normal quality of life.”

Dr. Chang sees patients at the newly opened Genesis Spine Center, and often helps patients with neck or back pain, two difficult-to-diagnose and common spinal symptoms that cause significant distress and disability. Yet in his 15 years of experience with rehabilitation and spine-related pain and conditions,

Dr. Chang has seen a wide-variety of spinal disorders and symptoms; so he prides himself on completing thorough, comprehensive evaluations to correctly diagnose and treat spinal pain and disorders.

Therefore, my goal of treatment is to improve patients’ functions so they can have their life back again. Plus, we point our patients in the correct direction if they need specialty care.”

After a thorough examination and diagnostic work-up, Dr. Chang can treat patients or advise on treatment options in specialties he works closely with, like neurology, neurosurgery, pain management and other fields.

Dr. Chang and the highly qualified Genesis Spine Center team, which comprises of physical therapists and a specialized rehabilitation nurse, also prescribe and provide rehabilitation treatment, necessary medications, on-site

physical therapy assessment and treatment plan development, ongoing monitoring of treatment effectiveness and follow-up evaluations. New patients are being accepted at the spine center with a physician’s referral.

Dr. Chang earned his Doctor of Medicine degree from the State University of New York Health Science Center at Brooklyn, New York, where he also completed his residency in participation with King’s County Hospital Center.

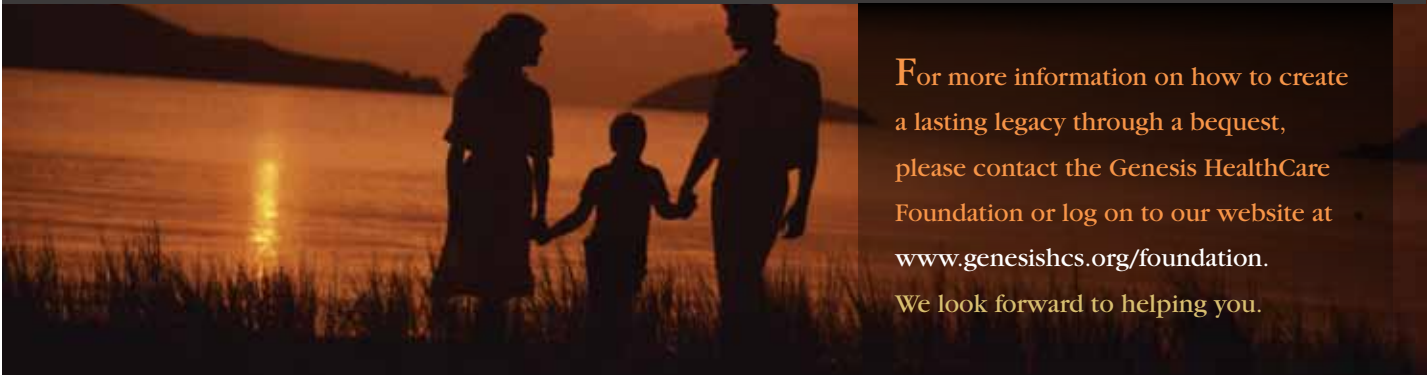

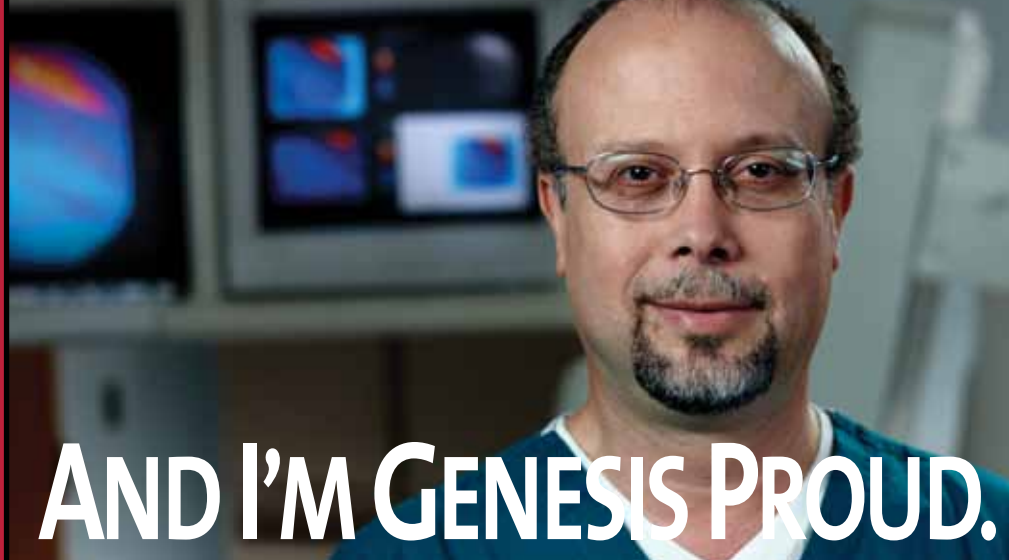

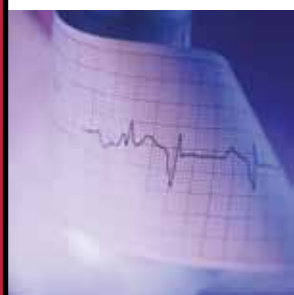
